

Mother's Day

How Did Mother's Day Begin?

On this day, in 16th century Britain, Christians would return to their 'mother' church. This was the main church in the town, the church they had been baptised in or the cathedral.

Visiting Mother

At that time in Britain, it was common for children to leave home, usually as young as ten years old, and get a job in domestic service. This would mean they lived at the place where they worked and were not allowed home very often.

Mothering Sunday was a rare day off when all children were allowed to go home to visit their mothers.

As they walked home, they would pick wild flowers along the paths and give these to their mothers. This led to the tradition of giving mothers flowers on Mother's Day.

Fascinating Fact


For girls, working in domestic service meant being a servant or maid for a wealthy family.

Boys would work in the stables, tending the horses.

Refreshment Sunday and Lent

In the UK, Mother's Day always falls on the fourth Sunday of Lent. This day used to be known as Refreshment Sunday. This was because Lent was a time of fasting when people did not eat food that was considered bad for you. However, on Refreshment Sunday the rules about Lent were not as strict and people were allowed to eat more tempting foods.

Mother's Day in Australia, however, is always on the second Sunday of May.






Traditional Food

Simnel cake is a fruit cake with two layers of almond paste and 11 balls of marzipan. The marzipan balls represent the twelve disciples. However, because Judas gave Jesus away to the Roman soldiers, he is not represented on the simnel cake.

The word simnel comes from the Latin word 'simila' which is a word for the fine wheat flour used to make the cake (semolina comes from the same Latin root).

Tuesday Canberra

Canberra is the capital city of Australia. It is located in the Australian Capital Territory (ACT). It is an inland city, meaning it has no coastal borders.

After Federation, when the six states were united and formed the Commonwealth of Australia, the government decided the country needed a capital city. Both Melbourne and Sydney wanted to be the capital of Australia. Melbourne was a fast-growing city due to the gold rush, but Sydney was the oldest Australian city.

After much debate, the government decided on a location in-between the two major cities. Due to its cooler climate and location, inland and being away from coastal attack, a location was found. During the interim, while Canberra was being constructed, Melbourne served as the temporary capital city of Australia.

In 1911, after the location of Canberra was decided, the government announced the Federal Capital Design Competition, which was an international competition to find a unique design for the capital city.


In 1912, it was announced that Walter Burley Griffin, an American architect, and his wife, Marion Mahony Griffin, won the competition and Canberra was constructed from their winning design. Canberra's Parliament House was opened twenty-seven years after Federation.

Old Parliament House was where Australia met from 1927 to 1988.

Important decisions and debates about the newly formed nation of Australia were discussed in this building. The old Parliament House had its own library, post office, dining room, bar,

workshop and barber. It is currently used house the Museum of Australian Democracy and is listed on the National Heritage Register.

The new Parliament House sits on Capital Hill behind the older building. Construction started in 1981 and the design incorporated the shape of two boomerangs with a large flagpole at its centre. Parliament house has 4700 rooms and approximately 5000 people work there on sitting days.

Anzac Day



What Is Anzac Day?

Anzac Day is a day of remembrance that takes place on 25th April. It is mostly celebrated in Australia and New Zealand but people from these countries who live in other parts of the world may take part in special services and activities.

Australia and New Zealand Join the First World War

- · August 1914 Britain declared war on Germany.
- Australia still had strong ties with Great Britain so the Australian Prime Minister agreed to send troops to fight with Britain in the war.
- April 1915 soldiers from Australia and New Zealand were sent to capture the Gallipoli peninsula.

The Battle of Gallipoli

The Australian and New Zealand Army Corps (ANZACs) landed at Gallipoli at dawn on 25th April 1915. This was the first major fight of the war for these two countries. They planned to defeat Turkey as quickly as possible in a quick battle; however, the battle lasted eight months. At the end of 1915, the ANZAC forces were rescued from the beach.

Many were killed during the Battle of Gallipoli. Over 8000 Australian soldiers and more than 2500 New Zealander soldiers lost their lives. Although they did not achieve their goal, the bravery and determination of the ANZACs during this time turned a terrible event into a legend.

The ANZAC Spirit

By the end of the war, more than 70,000 Australian and New Zealander soldiers had lost their lives. When the total population of these countries at the time is considered, this was a substantial number. The spirit of the brave ANZACs was known around the world and meant Australia and New Zealand was thought of as a reliable, strong nation.





How Is Anzac Day Celebrated?

The first Anzac Day was celebrated on 25th April 1916. A popular tradition of Anzac day is a dawn service. This is a ceremony which includes the raising of flags, the reading of relevant passages and a performance of the Last Post. This is followed by a minute's silence. Many schools will hold their own Anzac ceremony.

Parades are usually held every year in local towns and major cities. Originally, ANZAC soldiers marched in these parades. Now, it is common for the children, grandchildren and great-grandchildren of ANZAC soldiers to march in them. They wear the medals or carry something belonging to their ancestors. Nowadays, these parades are more celebratory events with crowds lining the streets to cheer on and applaud the members of the military. There is a sense of pride in what these brave men and women have done, and continue to do, for Australia.




Being Safe Online


