# **HUMAN HISTORIES - AMAZING ACHIEVEMENTS**

# SIRIMAVO BANDARANAIKE

(1916-2000)



First female Prime Minister in modern history Sirimavo Bandaranaike was born in Sri Lanka. She was a member of the aristocracy (upper class). In 1940, Bandaranaike married Solomon Bandaranaike, a Member of Parliament. He became Prime Minister of Cevlon (now Sri Lanka) in 1956. After her husband was shot dead in 1959. Sirimavo became the leader of his political party. She won an election in July 1960, becoming the world's first female Prime Minister. Over time, her policies became unpopular. She was voted out of leadership in 1965 but was re-elected as Prime Minister in 1970. She faced much criticism and was even accused of corruption. After delaying the election for two years, Bandaranaike finally lost the Prime Ministership in the 1977 election, despite retaining her seat. Her daughter later became President of Sri Lanka, reinstating her mother as Prime Minister in 1994. Bandaranaike held this position until August 2000. She died two months later of a heart attack, aged 84.

# AMELIA EARHART

(1897 - 1939)




First woman to fly solo across the Atlantic Ocean Amelia Earhart was an American aviator and author. In 1922, she became the first woman to fly a plane at an altitude of 14 000 feet. During her career, Earhart broke many records, demonstrating that women were worthy of being taken seriously in aviation. On 20 May 1932, Earhart had the honour of being the first woman to fly solo across the Atlantic Ocean. She vanished over the South Pacific in July 1937 while attempting to be the first woman to circumnavigate the globe by air. Authorities declared her dead in 1939.

# HICHAM EL GUERROUJ


(1974 -)



World record holder for running the fastest mile Hicham El Guerrouj was born in Morocco and was one of seven children. His father owned a small restaurant. The family used to make the young Hicham run a mile to the bakery to get bread and return before the bread was cold. At the age of 14, El Guerrouj entered his first cross-country race. A year later, he left school and began training as a runner. Participating in his first Olympic Games in 1996, El Guerrouj fell over during his race and finished last. Despite this setback, his running achievements grew over the following years. In 1999, he broke the world record for the mile (1.6 km), running it in just 3 minutes and 43 seconds. El Guerrouj has used his fame for good, becoming a UNICEF Goodwill Ambassador in the same year. He is considered one of the greatest middle-distance runners of all time.

# EDMUND HILLARY

(1919-2008)



### First to climb to the summit of Mt Everest

Edmund Hillary was a New Zealand explorer and mountaineer. Developing a love of climbing from a young age, he climbed his first major mountain at the age of 20. Accompanied by a Nepalese Sherpa and mountaineer named Tenzing Norgay, Hillary reached the summit of Mt Everest – the tallest mountain in the world – on 28 May 1953. Hillary and Norgay battled high altitudes and a 12-metre rock wall (now known as Hillary's Step) to reach the summit. Hillary continued exploring later in life, joining expeditions to both the South and North Poles. He died of heart failure in his hometown of Auckland, aged 88.







Could (one day) a robot become my best friend?



# Malala Yousafzai

### WHO IS MALALA YOUSAFZAI?

Malala Yousafzai is a young Pakistani Human Rights Activist who fights for the rights of girls and women to receive an education. She became a household name by surviving an assassination attempt by the Taliban. She risked her life for the cause and has changed history.





# **Early Life**

Malala was born on 12 July 1997, in Mingora, Khyber Pakhtunkhwa, Pakistan. Her father, Ziauddin, was a teacher who ran several schools in the local district. Her mother, Toor Pekai, had little education and worked in the home, raising Malala and her two younger brothers. The family practise the religion of Islam, following many traditional practices such as *Salat* (the five daily prayers).

### Education

Many Pakistani girls did not attend school. However, Malala's father ran a school for girls, which she attended. Malala loved school and had big dreams of becoming a teacher, a doctor or a politician. When the Taliban (a fundamentalist religious movement from Pashtun) began to take control of the area where Malala lived, they demanded that all girls' schools be shut down. Women were no longer allowed to vote or to have jobs. All women and girls were to stay home. If they went out, they had to wear a burga (a garment that covers the head, face and body) and be accompanied by a man. In January 2008, Malala was forced to farewell her classmates, not knowing if she would ever have the opportunity to see them again.

# Social Activism

In 2009, Malala began to write a blog about the destruction and closure of more than 100 girls' schools in Pakistan. She used the penname 'Gul Makai' – a brave female character from a Pakastani folktale. She became famous for her blog, which was called *Diary of a Pakistani Schoolgirl*. During this time, Malala also began speaking publicly against the Taliban. Despite the Taliban threatening to kill her, she bravely continued fighting for the rights of girls and women to receive an education in Pakistan. Schools eventually reopened, but the Taliban remained in force throughout Pakistani cities.


# **Assassination Attempt**

In 2012, Malala was on her school bus when a masked gunman boarded and asked, "Who is Malala?" He said he would shoot everyone on the bus if they did not tell. When Malala's scared friends looked her way, the gunman shot Malala. The bullet passed through her head, missing her left eye and her brain. Malala was given emergency treatment in Pakistan, and then relocated to Great Britain for further medical support. During her treatment, people worldwide began supporting her cause.

# The Fight Continues

Amazingly, Malala survived this horrendous ordeal. On her sixteenth birthday, she presented a speech to the United Nations, imploring that all children around the world receive an education. In 2014, at the age of seventeen, Malala was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize – the youngest ever winner of this award. She continues to fight for peace and equality through her charity, the Malala Fund. Malala is determined to help build a world where "all girls can learn and lead".














Well, once you send it to someone's device, they have a copy and they can use it however they want. They could send it to anyone! You can no longer control who sees it.




Some online platforms also have permission to use any photos you upload through their service, meaning all your photos and messages could be saved by those companies and sent anywhere.





Even if platforms say they delete the photo straight away, people can make copies just from seeing things on the screen. They call this a 'digital footprint'.


